Appealing a social welfare decision



Many people who apply for a disability or carer type of welfare payment have their application refused.



It is wise to appeal a social welfare refusal.

Appeals have very high success rates. In 2017, more than 7 in 10 Disability Allowance appeals were successful.



If you were refused a payment, you can appeal this to the Social Welfare Appeals Office on this form. You must do this in less than **21 days**.



Get help from an advocate, family member or friend if you need it.



The first step is for a 'deciding officer' to look at your case again and any new information you send.

This desk review can take a long time. Some reviews take 20 weeks.



You should send in any extra information to support your case. This could be a doctor's letter, a therapists report or a care diary. Send it to the Department you were dealing with. See here for contact details.



If the 'review' does not change the decision you will get a meeting with an Appeals Officer. You will be able to state your case in person.
